

HISTORY

The Alfred Street Baptist Church (ASBC) founded in 1803 in Old Town, Alexandria, VA created the ASBC Foundation in 2002 as a separate organization to expand the outreach of the church. The Foundation was to be a non-profit, charitable organization that was organized as a Virginia non-stock corporation. The organization formally received its 501(c)(3) non-profit status in 2005 and was then eligible to begin accepting tax deductible donations. The Board looked at several potential community outreach efforts and in 2006, the Foundation Board voted to make college scholarships for high achieving, financially challenged students our main focus. This was an attempt to increase college participation within this neglected segment of the population.

The Foundation awarded its first scholarships totaling \$75K in 2007 to 11 students. Since then, we have awarded more than \$2.5 million dollars in scholarships to 540 students including high school seniors, divinity and graduate school students. We award two types of scholarships: Millennium and Legacy Scholarships. Millennium Scholarships are for \$20,000 over 4 years (\$5K per year) and are awarded to our highest scoring students on the achievement and financial need rating scales. There are two such awards each year. Legacy Scholarships are funded by individual donors who determine the amount (e.g., \$5,000, \$10,000, etc.) and add their own selection criteria to the Foundation's minimum requirements.

Annually in the spring of each year, we receive approximately 600 fairly extensive application packages from students throughout the Washington Metropolitan area (District of Columbia, Maryland and Virginia, aka DMV). A panel of education experts/volunteers review the application packages, rating each student in about several areas (grades, SAT, extra curricular activities, essay, recommendations, community service, etc.) and select students for in-person interviews. From those interviews, new scholarships are awarded ranging from \$1,000 to \$30,000. Some are for one year and some are for four years. We also give a limited number of scholarships to students pursuing graduate and divinity school degrees.

MISSION STATEMENT

The Foundation strives to increase access to postsecondary education to graduating high school students in the DMV who excel academically but need financial assistance in order to fulfill their educational goals.

ORGANIZATIONAL PHILOSOPHY

The Foundation's philosophy is that higher education is a catalyst and an agent of change for individuals, families and communities.

We see ourselves as a premier organization to make that change possible and to give students a greater vision of possibilities beyond their family and community history.

The Foundation believes that students need and deserve education beyond high school and the lack of money should not be an obstacle to a student striving to achieve their goals

GOALS

Provide the opportunity for more graduating high school students in the DMV to attend college by lessening some of the financial challenges and helping them to and through college by providing scholarships, information, encouragement and advising.

Seek donations from a variety of sources (individuals, organizations, corporations, etc.) and inspire them to be partners with the Foundation by providing donations for scholarships over multiple years.

Maintain impeccable financial accounting and reporting so as to keep the trust of our current donors and gain trust from our potential donors who seek to verify our operations.

Embrace opportunities for growth and improvement and reach for new and attainable milestones.

VALUES

Education and its Impact – Changing lives, families and generations through education is a core value. We believe in education and that a college education is a great equalizer to alleviate some larger systemic problems in our society. When we empower students (especially low-income and first generational families) to further their education, by mitigating financial barriers, we help them to seek a better life and assure their success in society. We recognize students' potential and use our resources to advocate for those students who have the greatest need in our community. Once in college, they will become aware of their capabilities, which will then fuel their desire to complete their education.

Integrity – Our reputation is paramount in order to assure our stakeholders that our words and actions are trustworthy and reliable. We will conduct business in a way that is honest, transparent, ethical and demonstrate that we are good stewards of the resources that have been entrusted to us.

Excellence - We endeavor to show the world that we are not only pursuing something important, but that we are doing it well. We build and retain a donor base which is dedicated to supporting the financial needs of a growing base of students who desire to attend college. We advocate and pursue a culture of continuous improvement in our operations and processes. We set tangible and attainable benchmarks that ensure continued growth. We surround ourselves with people who have the passion, desire and commitment to better our organization.

Duty - We believe that it is our responsibility to give back to help students achieve their educational goals. We want to serve as a guiding light in the Washington Metropolitan area to reach out to students who have the desire but not the financial resources to fulfill their educational dreams.

PRODUCT



The Foundation makes a concerted effort to reach students who are economically challenged, yet still excel academically despite the odds. If requested, we provide some students with additional financial assistance, counseling, and other support. As a result, we have a **97% success rate** based on first semester college GPAs of 2.0 or above. Many scholarships are for one year **only**, so tracking student success, beyond the freshman year, is randomly done. Since 2007, our students have attended **142** of our nation's top universities.



THE ASBC FOUNDATION 2022 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Highlights

- Completed the Foundation's 2021 Annual Report which was sent to donors, ASBC leadership and potential donors.
- Awarded \$445,751 for 180 scholarship awards to 83 new high school seniors, four upper classmen, three graduate students,
 three divinity school students and 54 college students whose scholarships were renewed.
- Achieved a 7% increase in the money given for scholarships; achieved a 33% increase in the number of scholarships given.
- Achieved a 97% retention rate of the 2021 Legacy Scholarship donors; added 20 new Legacy donors for a 32% increase.
- Received a new \$100,000 Endowment from Craig T. and Diane E. Welburn.
- Retained and signed Gift Agreements, for scholarships, with two corporate donors, Deloitte & Touche, LLP and Ernst & Young;
 signed a new Gift Agreement with McDonald's Capital Business Unit, the recognized association of McDonald's Franchisees
 and Operators in the Washington, DC, Baltimore and Eastern Shore area.

Process Improvement

- Elected and on-boarded four new board directors to expand the Finance, Fundraising and Scholarship Committees.
- Completed (all directors) Board Basics from A-Z Class given by the D.C. Pro Bono Center.
- Completed two Self-Assessments done by Board Source and the University of Central Florida.
- Held the first ASBC Foundation Board Retreat which identified strategic plan activities.
- Completed a Strategic Plan in collaboration with the University of Central Florida.
- Created a Conflict of Interest document and a formal Endowment Agreement template.
- Refined WizeHive Application and Profile to be more efficient for the applicant, counselors and Scholarship Committee.

Scholarships

- Collaborated with 32 ASBC volunteers to review 600 applications and interview 140 students virtually.
- Supported and counseled students who struggled with academics and, other issues.
- Sent cover letters and scholarship recipient write-ups, as well as, follow-up progress reports to all donors.
- Sent Christmas gifts to all undergraduate scholarship recipients.
- Compiled and sent demographic information about scholarship recipients to the United Way.

Fundraising

- Obtained Gold Star rating for transparency on GUIDESTAR.
- Performed major donor development in Alexandria, specifically "Old Town." Effected increased giving of current donors.
- Led the Foundation's participation in the 2022 Combined Federal Campaign with several appeals via Constant Contact. Received pledges of \$69,000. Attended CFC Charity Fairs at several federal agencies in the DMV.
- Initiated the IN THE SPOTLIGHT monthly e-blast to donors and retained readership of 60-65% vs 15-20% for most non-profits.
- Initiated a Fundraising auxiliary of 5 major fundraisers to advise the Board.
- Raised \$8,000 during the "Giving Tuesday" campaign.


- Performed all financial-related Foundation duties (receipt and disbursement of funds, and handling of other banking matters).
- Processed and reconciled 2022 financial data into QuickBooks; worked with ASBC auditors; received highest 2021 audit rating.
- Prepared monthly financial statements and reports (P&L, Balance Sheet and Legacy Report) for Foundation Board meetings.
- Coordinated the creation of the annual budget by month for 2022 and 2023.
- Processed all scholarship payments to various colleges & universities for scholarship awardees through QuickBooks.
- Accounted for all transactions and maintained balances for Foundation Legacy accounts.
- Prepared Foundation's 2021 tax return and filed with the IRS.
- Revised the Foundation Investment Policy.
- Handled all rental property activities (taxes, insurance, repairs, and calculated depreciation).

Administrative

- Recorded and maintained all Foundation minutes.
- Sent "Thank You" correspondences to all donors.
- Sent letters of acknowledgement and Christmas cards to Legacy Scholarship owners.
- Served as Nomination Committee for selection of 2023 Foundation Officers.

SOURCES OF REVENUE

The Foundation receives funding from multiple sources: Legacy Scholarships, corporate entities, real estate, investment income, general donations, and miscellaneous (see chart below). **Please note that the 2022 financials presented here are unaudited**.




- 1 Legacy Scholarship Donations = \$605K

Clearly, our largest source of funding is Legacy Scholarships. Donors, who desire to honor a person or an institution, find the Legacy Scholarship a convenient vehicle for meeting their goals. The Legacy Scholarships are funded by individuals, families, sororities, church ministries and other organizations who provide their own criteria (e.g., specific college, specific gender, HBCU, PWI, STEM, specific majors, etc.) in addition to the Foundation's general criteria. Some Legacy scholarships are funded for more than one year. The Legacy Scholarships awarded in 2022 vary from \$1,000 to \$30,000 and were funded by various individuals and organizations as summarized in the table below. Column1 delineates the category of Legacy donors and the number of donors in that category. Column 2 provides the number of scholarships given by that category of donors in 2022. Column 3 provides the range of the dollar amount for the scholarships given in that category.

SOURCES OF EXPENSES

The Foundation Expenses consists of Scholarship payouts (87%); rental expenses (2%) for insurances, taxes, repairs and management; monetary gifts to students (3%), investment and banking expenses, etc. The chart below depicts the distribution of our expenses.

As expected, our largest expense is for scholarship payouts followed by expenses needed to maintain the Jacqueline Henry Green house and property. At Christmas each student is presented with a monetary token and if, during the year, they need help paying for such things as transcripts (which are required for them to send at the end of each semester), the Foundation helps with those nominal fees. The other expenses are a part of our general operating expenses. This year a retreat was held, facilitated by a consultant.

THE ASBC 2022 FOUNDATION BOARD OF DIRECTORS


Our Board of Directors consists of 14 persons who are appointed by the Pastor (3), the Diaconate Chairman (3), or nominated and elected as At-Large Members by the Board itself. The Board of Directors consist of the following:



PRESIDENT: Deacon Patricia M. Wallace was elected President of the Foundation Board in 2019. She previously served as Vice-President of the Foundation for 2009-2015 as well as Secretary before that. She has served as a deacon at ASBC since 1999 and was elected Chair of the Board of Deacons for 2016-2018. Before that she served as Vice Chair of the Pulpit Committee that called Pastor Howard-John Wesley as ASBC's 8th pastor in 2008. Professionally, Deacon Wallace retired as an Engineering Center Manager for Northrop Grumman Corporation following a long career in software development and project management.
